Scoutmaster's Corner

Dear Troop 314,

When I joined this troop in 2006, it was a small troop, with somewhere between 25 and 30 Scouts. But it was a good fit

for us, and we liked it. And in all the years since, I think it has remained in the 20-30 scout size range. As boys aged out, or Eagled out, new ones would come in, usually from nearby Cub Scout Packs, but also sometimes from family connections. Each year, about 6 boys would leave, and about 6 (one patrol's worth) would join, so we'd stay about the same size.

We are currently down to 21 Scouts, which is a fine size for a small troop. But we don't have a "line" on any new recruits for this spring. We have several Scouts who I'm hopeful will attain Eagle this year, and while we prefer they remain active in Scouts, it's not unusual for Scouts to turn to other endeavors after they reach Eagle. If they do choose to leave Scouts, then we will dip below the 20-Scout mark.

I think it's time we started recruiting in earnest.

Our current recruitment activities consist of Camp-o-ree, Scout-o-Rama, Lookie-Loo, and Webelos Woods, with an occasional Cub-oriented event, such as our rocket-launching picnic.

But that rocket launch was aimed only at Pack 314, which doesn't have any Webelos 2's bridging over this year. And Camp-o-ree is only partially about recruitment.

We need to consider recruiting at several nearby Packs. I've gotten wind of another troop in our district which is acquiring 48 Webelos this year!! It's a safe bet that those are not all from one "feeder Pack". They must have done some serious recruiting.

Your current SPL is now promoting the idea of a "Belt Loop Day" this summer, and I think that is a great idea. Belt loops are part of a program called the Cub Scouts Sports and Academics program, but that program is being discontinued in about one year. This means that this may be one of their last chances to earn belt loops. Let's make it a great event!

Did you know that the national website, scouting.org, has a bunch of other recruiting ideas? Just take a look at:

There are 15 suggestions listed, and the very first one is a "Bike Rodeo". This is something that we used to do for Pack 314, but haven't for several years now. I think we need to revive that tradition.

If you have some ideas to recruit new members, or just want to pitch in and help, let us know! You can speak to me, or to the SPL, or the Recruitment Chair, Mr. Tran.

Troop 314 is a great troop, with great people, but it couldn't hurt to "bulk up" a little. With more Scouts, that means we also will have more parents to help out, and that means more possibilities for a great program!







Meeting Night Patrols

Skill Patrol Leaders remember when you are planning the skills for the meeting, make sure that two levels of Skills should be worked out and that

they are appropriate to the Troop Program Features Theme. It is best that everyone is (and can be) involved. When possible – see if a competition or game & competition can be made out of your skills.

The patrol that has flag ceremony /setup / cleanup should show up by 6:45pm (earlier if it's a court of honor). It's the patrol leader's responsibility to make sure they do. *This means picking up the phone to confirm*.

Email or text are OK, but are not a substitute for direct bi-directional **voice** communication – a confirmed message transmission.

No one in the patrol should leave until everything is cleaned up and put away, or the patrol leader releases them.

Dutch Oven Cooking is only done during specified meetings. For example, Hot dogs and cooking are usually done when we have Webelos visit.

SCOUT IN CHARGE – YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

If you are the Scout -in-charge of an outing, activity, service project, Eagle project, training, patrol meeting, etc, after your event, please turn in your attendance sheet to advancement chair so the participants can get credit for attending.

The log should include date, start & stop time, location, and the list of who attended. If it's a service/Eagle project, it should include the hours that each participant worked to the nearest half-hour.

If it's a camping trip, it should include number of nights camped for each participant.

It's important to turn in this information in a timely manner. Some scouts may need these activities for advancement. You can hand deliver a paper report or email it to the advancement chair.

"Keeping you informed"

Boy leaders should work on the items listed below during their tenure in this position. They may be asked what they did at the end of their service by Mr. M.

If your scout needs guidance, he can go to Mr. Marubayshi, or his patrol advisor for help. Parents, we are listing scout responsibilities here so that you can be informed, and can remind your scout of his responsibilities too. This month we are highlighting:



WHAT DOES A Patrol Leader DO?

Job Description: The Patrol Leader is elected by the patrol and **leads** the patrol.

Reports to: The Senior Patrol Leader

Mininum Rank: 1st Class

Patrol Leader duties:

- Show up to meeting on time or 15 minutes before meeting starts if have set up.
- Get Trained by Scoutmaster.
- · Plan and lead patrol meetings.
- Finds out what patrol wants to be doing and brings topic to JLC meeting to get implemented.
- Plan and lead patrols responsibility at Troop meeting. (skill, flag, game or other troop program feature event).
- Plan and lead an activity.
- Keeps there patrol under control.
- Keep patrol members informed (not just emails either – need to talk to them to confirm communication).
- Assign each patrol member a job and help them succeed. (They need at least an assistant patrol leader).
- Represent the patrol at all Junior Leaders' Council (JLC) meetings and at the annual program planning conference.
- Prepares the patrol to take part in all Troop activities. (Camporee, Scout o Rama, hikes camps etc.

- Develop a patrol spirit with a Patrol Flag, Cheer and song.
- Attends at least 2/3 of each event type during his service period.
- Work with other troop leaders to make the troop run well.
- Know what patrol members and other leaders can do.
- Sets the right example.
- · Wears the Scout uniform correctly.
- Makes a point to live by the Scout Oath and Law.

BSA "Sweet 16"

So you are planning an outing and you want to make sure you are ready. The first thing that crosses your mind is; "Will the scouts be safe on this outing"? Look no further. The Sweet 16 of Scouting will help set your mind at ease. Review these simple points before the outing and set your mind at ease. Few youth organizations encompass the breadth, volume and diversity of physical activity common to Scouting, and none enjoy a better safety record. The key to maintaining and improving this exemplary record is the conscientious and trained adult leader who is attentive to safety concerns.

As an aid in the continuing effort to protect participants in Scout activity, the BSA National Health & Safety Committee and the Council Services Division of the BSA National Council have developed the "Sweet Sixteen" of BSA safety procedures for physical activity. These 16 points, which embody good judgment and common sense, are applicable to all activities.

1. QUALIFIED SUPERVISION

Every BSA activity should be supervised by a conscientious adult who understands and knowingly accepts responsibility for the well-being and safety of the children and youth in his or her care. The supervisor should be sufficiently trained, experienced and skilled in the activity to be confident of his/her ability to lead and to teach the necessary skills and to respond effectively in the event of an emergency. Field knowledge of all applicable BSA standards and a commitment to implement and follow BSA policy and

procedures are essential parts of the supervisor's qualifications.

2. PHYSICAL FITNESS

For youth participants in any potentially strenuous activity, the supervisor should receive a complete health history from a health care professional, parent or guardian. Adult participants and youth involved in higher-risk activity (e.g., scuba) may require professional evaluation in addition to the health history. The supervisor should adjust all supervision, discipline and protection to anticipate potential risks associated with individual health conditions. Neither youth nor adults should participate in activity for which they are unfit. To do so would place both the individual and others at risk.

3. BUDDY SYSTEM

The long history of the "buddy system" in Scouting has shown that it is always best to have at least one other person with you and aware at all times as to your circumstances and what you are doing in any outdoor or strenuous activity.

4. SAFE AREA OR COURSE

A key part of the supervisor's responsibility is to know the area or course for the activity and to determine that it is well-suited and free of hazards.

5. EQUIPMENT SELECTION AND MAINTENANCE Most activity requires some specialized equipment. The equipment should be selected to suit the participant and the activity and to include appropriate safety and program features. The supervisor should also check equipment to determine that it is in good condition for the activity and is properly maintained while in use.

6. PERSONAL SAFETY EQUIPMENT

The supervisor must ensure that every participant has and uses the appropriate personal safety equipment. For example, activity afloat requires a PFD properly worn by each participant; bikers, horseback riders, and whitewater kayakers need helmets for certain activity; skaters may need protective gear; and all need to be dressed for warmth and utility depending on the circumstances.

7. SAFETY PROCEDURES AND POLICIES
For most activities there are common sense
procedures and standards that can greatly reduce the
risk. These should be known and appreciated by all
participants, and the supervisor must ensure
compliance.

8. SKILL LEVEL LIMITS

There is a minimum skill level requirement for every activity, and the supervisor must identify and recognize this minimum skill level and be sure that none are put at risk by attempting activity beyond their ability. A good example of skill levels in Scouting is the venerable "swim test" which defines conditions for safe swimming based on individual ability.

9. WEATHER CHECK

The risk factors in many outdoor activities vary substantially with weather conditions. These variables and the appropriate response should be understood and anticipated.

10. PLANNING

Safe activity follows a plan that has been conscientiously developed by the experienced supervisor or other competent source. Good planning minimizes risks and also anticipates contingencies that may require emergency response or a change of plan.

11. COMMUNICATIONS

The supervisor needs to be able to communicate effectively with participants as needed during the activity. Emergency communications also need to be considered in advance for any foreseeable contingencies.

12. PERMIT AND NOTICES

BSA tour permits, council office registration, government or landowner authorization, and any similar formalities are the supervisor's responsibility when such are required. Appropriate notification should be directed to parents, enforcement authorities, landowners, and others as needed, before and after the activity.

13. FIRST AID RESOURCES

The supervisor should determine what first aid supplies to include among the activity equipment. The level of first aid training and skill appropriate for the activity should also be considered. An extended trek over remote terrain obviously may require more first aid resources and capabilities than an afternoon activity in the local community.

14. APPLICABLE LAWS

BSA safety policies generally parallel or go beyond legal mandates, but the supervisor should confirm and ensure compliance with all applicable regulations or statutes.

15. CPR RESOURCE

Any strenuous activity or remote trek could present a cardiac emergency. Aquatic programs may involve cardiopulmonary emergencies. The BSA strongly recommends that a CPR-trained person (preferably an adult) be part of the leadership for any BSA program. Such a resource should be available for strenuous outdoor activity.

16. DISCIPLINE

No supervisor is effective if he or she cannot control the activity and the individual participants. Youth must respect their leader and follow direction.

In addition to these general rules, safety concerns in certain BSA activities, including most of the aquatics programs, have been specifically addressed in more detailed guidelines. All leaders should review and comply with such guidelines in the respective activities.

Got bad trail hunger?

Make Chili!

I learned how to make chili from an old pro who has been making this chili recipe for her husband for over 50 years starting on their honeymoon.

Make a big batch, dry it and divide into individual servings. It rehydrates well on the trail and I hear from lots of folks who love it.

Beef & Bean Chili Recipe

Serves 3 - 5

Ingredients:

- 1 to 1¼ pounds lean ground beef or turkey
- ½ cup bread crumbs, finely ground
- 1 large onion
- 1 − 2 cloves garlic
- 3 Tbsp Chili Powder
- 1 15 oz. can kidney or red beans, drained
- 1 10 oz. can tomato puree
- 1 14 oz. can diced tomatoes

In the kitchen:

Work bread crumbs into ground meat with your fingers and set aside for a moment. I add bread crumbs because dehydrated meat infused with bread crumbs rehydrates better on the trail. Also, the bread crumbs absorb and lock in more of the chili flavor. If you are not planning on dehydrating this chili recipe for backpacking, there is no need to add bread crumbs to the meat. You can <u>make your own bread crumbs</u> by dehydrating bread.

Sautee onions and garlic in a little olive oil using just enough to coat the pan. It really helps to use a nonstick pan.



Add ground meat and cook for about ten minutes until browned, stirring continuously.

Add chili powder and cook for one more minute.

Add tomato puree, diced tomatoes, and drained beans.

Cook until bubbling and then reduce heat to a simmer for one hour.

Dehydrate:

Have a taste and put the rest in the refrigerator overnight. The extra time enhances the flavor. Hitting the trail in the morning? Start dehydrating immediately.



Spread chili out on dehydrator trays covered with nonstick Paraflexx® Sheets or parchment paper.

Dehydrate at 125° for 8 – 10 hours. This recipe took up three 15 x 15 Excalibur Dehydrator trays. After about four hours in the dehydrator, break up any meat and beans that might be stuck together with a spoon or your fingers to expose pieces to more air circulation.

Once dry, divide dehydrated chili into one cup or larger servings and pack in plastic zip-lock bags.

Yield: Five cups weighing about 12 ounces dry.

On the Trail:

Combine one cup chili with one cup water and let sit for about five minutes. If you are cooking a larger serving, just add an equal part of water to your dried chili.



Light stove, bring to a boil and continue cooking for one minute.

Remove from stove and place pot inside insulating <u>pot</u> cozy for ten minutes.

Garnish with crackers, dried pita bread chips or cheddar cheese.
